2008	Annual Conference-Washington DC: The 2008 program consisted of 31 universities, which represents 83 students and eleven corporations. The winning teams are: 1st Place: Florida A & M University - \$15,000, 2nd Place: University of Tennessee - \$12,000 and 3rd Place: University of Texas at Austin - \$8,000
2007	Annual Conference-Orlando, FL: The 2007 program consisted of 30 universities, winning teams were: 1st place: Florida A & M University - \$15,000, 2nd place: New York University - \$12,000 and 3rd place: University of Chicago - \$8,000
2006	Annual Conference-Atlanta, GA: The 2006 program consisted of 29 universities, winning teams were: 1st place: University of Stellenbosch, <i>South Africa</i> - \$15,000, 2nd place: Hampton University - \$12,000, and 3rd place: University of Georgia - \$8,000
2005	Annual Conference-San Diego, CA: The 2005 program consisted of 28 universities, winning teams were University of Georgia, first place (\$15,000), Michigan State University, second place (\$12,000), Pennsylvania State, and third place (\$8,000).
2004	Annual Conference-Houston, TX: The 2004 program consisted of 30 universities, winning teams were: 1 st Place Michigan State University (\$12,000), 2 nd Place Georgia State University (\$9,000), and 3 rd Place Baylor University (\$6,000).
2003	Annual Conference-Philadelphia, PA: The 2003 program consisted of 34 universities, the winning teams were: Vanderbilt University (\$12,000), Emory University (\$9,000), and Bentley College (\$6,000).
2002	Annual Conference-Nashville, TN: The 2002 program consisted of 32 universities. The winning teams were Michigan State University (\$12,000), University of California-Los Angeles (\$9,000), and University of Michigan (\$6,000).

1997	Annual Conference-Dallas, TX: The 1997 program team participation again increased to a record 30 universities competing for scholarship honors. The winning teams were: 1st place, Duke University (\$7,500); 2nd place, Stanford University (\$6,000); 3rd place, University of North Carolina (\$4,500).	
1996	Annual Conference-New Orleans, LA: The 1996 program team participation increased to 29 universities competing for the top rankings. The winning teams were: 1st place, Emory University (\$7,500); 2nd place, Johns Hopkins University (\$6,000); 3rd place, University of Tennessee (\$4,500).	
1995	Annual Conference-Boston, MA: The 1995 program team participation included 27 universities competing for three winning slots. Judges were solicited through our corporate partners and NBMBA board members. The winning teams were: 1st place, University of Tennessee (\$7,500); 2nd place, Johns Hopkins University (\$6,000); 3rd place, Stanford University (\$4,500).	
1994	Annual Conference-San Francisco, CA: The 1994 program included the participation of 24 universities competing for three winning slots. Judges were solicited through our corporate partners and NBMBA board members. The winning teams were: 1st place, Johns Hopkins University (\$7,500); 2nd place, University of California - Berkeley (\$6,000); 3rd place University of Tennessee (\$4,500).	
1993	Annual Conference-Atlanta, GA: In 1993 there were 22 universities that competed for the top three winning slots. The program was expanded into two half days of competitions with our corporate partners, NBMBA board members and academic advisors participating as judges. The winning teams were: 1st place, University of Michigan (\$7,500); 2nd place, University of Southern California (\$6000); 3rd place, University of Alabama-Birmingham (\$4,500).	
1992	Annual Conference-St. Louis: The 1992 competition included a total of 21 participating universities. Winning teams were: 1st place, Purdue University, and 2nd place, American University (the teams received \$3000 for first place and \$1500 for second plus gifts from Amoco, for a total of \$5,740).
